Why Is It Essential to Connect Research and Practice in International Student Mobility?




The best research is that which leads to action, and the most impactful practitioners are those who implement evidence-based strategies to support international students.



Feedback mechanisms for continuous improvement	Participation in advisory committees for research projects


Scenario I – Research led iniative




Scenario II - Practitioner led iniative








Why does it not simply work?






Transformative Success Story – I *Mapping the field*

- Create positive change by fostering diversity and inclusion in Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) and Host Cities.

Global Reach

The Inclusion+ project brings together partners from four different countries, spanning diverse geographies: Iscte and the University of Porto (Portugal), Turku UAS and and University of Turku (Finland), Vilnius University (Lithuania), and Galatasaray University (Turkey).





Transformative Success Story – III Inclusion of students with fewer opportunities

- Lack of knowledge and data about students students with caring responsibilities and students with disabilities
- Partners: Researchers for 5 HEIs in 4 different countries, local ESN, IRO, host cities representatives
- Context: Erasmus+ KA2 Cooperation partnership
- Storytelling report, online invetory of promising practices, a roadmap os scenarios, inclusivity checklist to foster the institutional support for students

- Shared goals and flexible timelines.
- Innovative dissemination strategies to reach diverse stakeholders.
- D. By leveraging practical knowledge and academic expertise, impactful changes can be achieved!
